DRBA Sixteenth Annual Celebration

Historic Vade Mecum, a mineral springs spa from the early 1900s now part of Hanging Rock State Park in Danbury, NC, was a fascinating setting for DRBA's 16th Annual Celebration on March 3. Seventy-nine members and guests braved chilly weather in the large wooden gymnasium to peruse displays, participate in the business meeting, hear a stellar program, munch delicious goodies, and learn about DRBA's amazing accomplishments over the past year.

New board members elected were Jim Tobin, Tyler Carter, and Shawn Gorman. Newly appointed board secretary Margaret Petty gave the membership report, and retiring officers Wayne Kirkpatrick and Mark Bishopric were elected

to three-year terms, along with Laura Meder, who begins her second term.



DRBA staff members Jenny Edwards, Krista Hodges, and Brian Williams reported on highlights in 2017, which included development of new trails and parks, partnerships with other groups across the basin, significant educational programming, and robust stewardship activities. Office and Accounting Manager Robin Light gave a summary of DRBA's finances and goals. Tiffany Haworth, Executive Director, presented comments on the overall picture and stressed the importance of municipal partnerships in covering the 3,300 square

mile range of the Dan River and its many

tributaries.

Jennifer Atkins, Wayne Kirkpatrick, Sonya

Wolen, and Jenny Edwards presented well-deserved service awards to Dan LaPrad for his environmental education programs; Jeanean Bustamante for her outstanding service as an intern; Jessica Driver for her environmental stewardship as a Citizen Water Quality Monitor; the Boxley Corporation for its corporate partnership; and Julie Glandt, Volunteer of the Year.

Hanging Rock State Park Ranger Jason Anthony presented a very interesting, thoroughly researched program, "Stokes County Mineral Springs Resorts: Reclaiming

a Lost History." Unlike nearby Piedmont and Moores' springs, Vade Mecum is a rare survivor of the state's popular early twentieth century mineral springs resorts.

After a lunch of homemade chili, many participants explored the grounds on a hike led by Steve Shelton.

Partnerships

Dan River Implementation Team

The Implementation Team (IT), established to develop and enhance a regional marketing effort across the Dan River Basin, became an affiliate of DRBA in 2017, engaging DRBA as their fiscal agent to administer



the funding for the marketing campaign. The regional brand, "st8crossings," reflects the river's many state line crossings and the 8 core counties of the basin.

Financial support for the campaign has been received from Duke Energy and nine municipalities/counties throughout the region. The IT has also engaged the services of a marketing firm, Silver Lining Design, to upgrade the current marketing vehicles – the st8crossings web site, utilizing social media, and promoting the regional brand.

As this effort moves forward in promoting the natural

and cultural assets of the region, the IT is transitioning management of the marketing vehicles to the tourism and visitor center professionals across the basin. This expanded group is expected to provide funding for the campaign beyond 2018.

Duke Energy, as part of their reparations after the 2014 coal ash spill, provided initial funding for the marketing effort and established a solid foundation of a brand and basin-wide marketing campaign. Silver Lining Design will take the campaign to a higher level that will benefit the basin for years to come. Mark Bishopric

Eden's New Animal Shelter Trail

Life for shelter dogs in Eden is getting a little better. Friends of Eden Animal Rescue and DRBA teamed up to build a natural surface walking trail for volunteer dog walkers on City of Eden property near the Dan River.

On March 10th, some 17 volunteers gathered to hand finish the trail and "christen" it by walking shelter dogs. Volunteers also picked up several bags of trash.

According to Lisa Haraway Goldsworthy, Friends of Eden Animal Rescue board member, "Studies have shown that socialization and exercise have been positively correlated to increased adoption rates for shelter dogs. We expect that this trail will inspire people to come volunteer to give a dog a walk in the woods down to the beautiful Dan River, and in doing so, give those dogs a better chance to find loving homes."



Project funders include Rockingham County Community
Foundation with funding provided by Duke Energy, Reidsville Area Foundation, House of Health Eden,
CrossFit Eden, City of Eden, Eden Rivers & Trails Group, and DRBA members. It is the 4th animal shelter
trail inspired by DRBA, joining the Caswell County Animal Shelter, Rockingham County Animal Shelter, and
Martinsville Animal Shelter.

Friends of Eden Animal Rescue is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit founded in 2014 to save stray and shelter animals in the City of Eden and Rockingham County, NC. Rain Barrel Workshops

Rain barrel workshops have been popping up around the basin this spring, just in time for gardening season. In February DRBA held its first workshop of 2018 in Eden, NC, where over 20 participants from as far away as Salem and High Point attended, creating 20 barrels in Eden's second-ever rain barrel

workshop.



The next workshop was held in Danville, a first-time location for DRBA's rain barrel program, at the Danville Science Center. The City of Danville partnered with DRBA to

publicize the workshop and encourage participation. As a Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System, Danville is dedicated to providing better storm water education through partnerships with organizations like DRBA and the Danville Science Center. The workshop was a success, with 12 barrels being constructed

and taken home at the end of the evening.

The last workshop is scheduled for April 12th in Martinsville at the Virginia Museum of Natural History from 5:30-7:30 pm. Space is limited to 20 barrels and already a handful of participants have registered. Anyone who wants to attend must pre-register and pre-pay on the Shop DRBA page (www.danriver.org/shopdrba) or by contacting Krista Hodges at khodges@danriver.org to pre-pay by check. DRBA plans to hold more rain barrel workshops this fall or early next year.

Belews Park Planning Begins

Duke Energy has donated an approximate 100-acre parcel to Rockingham County for development as a passive park featuring a variety of amenities. Two public meetings and online surveys have suggested hiking and mountain biking trails, a disc golf course, a scenic overlook, an adventure playground, picnic shelter, restrooms, dog park area, and initial parking lot for 30 vehicles. Located in southwestern Rockingham County, the park will serve as an outdoor classroom for the RCC TRAILS program.

An Advisory Committee is working with the design company, obs Landscape Architects (obsla), to develop the Master Plan for the park, which was accepted by the Rockingham County Board of Commissioners with some requested revisions. Next step for obsla and the Advisory Committee is to prepare a Facility Design Manual for the Belews Lake Greenway, for which the park will serve as a future trailhead. The manual will include a branding package for signage and trail amenities and architectural character images for structures that may be associated with the greenway in the future. Wayne Kirkpatrick

January 6 on the Fieldale Trail

DRBA's first outing of the year was exploring the Lower Fieldale Trail, part of the Smith River Trail System, in Fieldale, VA. We chose this portion of the trail because



we thought it would offer the best scenery, and it did not disappoint. The Smith River was frozen over in most areas, and rhododendrons had gone into survival mode, curling their leaves in on themselves.

Staunton River State Park FSO

On a cold, sunny February 3, two dozen weather-brave folks and 3 dogs convened at Staunton River State Park, one of six original VA state parks that opened in 1936. Its 2,300 acres border the John H. Kerr Reservoir (Buggs Island Lake) and the Dan and Staunton rivers.

Led by the park's chief ranger, Ben Isaacs, we hiked 2 scenic miles, stopping first to admire original CCC-built cabins. We continued to 'The Point," a Virginia National

Landmark with a spectacular view, where the two rivers come together to feed the lake. As we spread out along the beach, the dogs dipped their paws into the river and drank from the giant water bowl.



From there we continued on through a lovely wooded area, passing the equestrian campground and stalls. It was a little early for flowers, but the lichen display was impressive.

The hike ended at the park's Olympic-sized pool, great for summertime. Ranger Isaacs told us about the park's designation as an International Dark Sky Park—ideal for stargazing. The park offers interpretive astronomy programs and rents telescopes.


March 3 Hike at Vade Mecum

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


